PE AND SPORT PREMIUM BUDGET 2022-2023

22-23 GRANT ALLOCATION: £16,980

The Government has continued to support PESSPA through the sport premium grant for the academic year 2021-22 and schools are expected to use the funding to show additional and sustainable improvement the PESSPA provision in the school. Parkside will continue to focus the spending in the following five areas:

- 1) The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – kick-starting healthy active lifestyles**
- 2) The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement**
- 3) Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport**
- 4) Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils**
- 5) Increased participation in competitive sport**

The following budget has been planned to enable our school to make improvements in the areas indicated above as well as into improving the learning environments used for PESSPA. All allocations are subject to change and will be updated throughout the year.
